


With long-buried secrets coming out into the open, false identities, and a man with a vendetta on the prowl, the stakes are at an all-time high in this new work.



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



#### SELINA SEN ZOON

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Selina Sen's articles have been published in most of India's leading dailies. She has also worked as a scriptwriter for a documentary series on art and was Correspondent for a Hong Kong-based publishing group for more than a decade. She has lived in Kashmir for three years and travelled extensively in the Valley, both before the insurgency as a student and during it while researching Zoon. Her first book, A Mirror Greens in Spring, was translated into several European languages and the French version shortlisted for the Prix du Premier Roman. She is working on her third novel, set in Kolkata, in and around the lane where her ancestral house still stands.

Sen lives in New Delhi with her son and a Lhasa Apso who imagines he is a lion.

Acclaimed Bollywood director Shantanu Rai is eager to begin shooting his magnum opus, Zoon, a film on Habba Khatoon, 16th century Kashmiri queen, poet, and musician. Joya, fresh out of film school, joins the production team to work alongside young Kashmiri historian Rashid.

The filming progreses well; the romantic landscape unfolding in picture-postcard vistas forms an irresistible backdrop for the film – as well as for Joya and Rashid to fall in love. But this is Kashmir at the onset of a crippling insurgency. A shocking incident of terrorism halts the shoot, and lives descend into interlocking spirals of loss and betrayal. Ten years on, Joya returns to Kashmir to complete the film and reach out to her lost love. She struggles in a strife-torn Valley, marred by curfews and barricades, despair and anger, until she finally discards Bollywood's rose-tinted lenses in a quest to face the truth.

Will Zoon the film ever get released? A powerful mingling of real and reel, past and present, the novel plays out against the violence and volatility of Kashmir.


#### JAWAHARA SAIDULLAH WHERE THE RIVERS MEET

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The four young men—"boys" her parents would have called them—had stopped her car by arranging their two scooters across the road, pretending they had been in an accident. #### POONAM SAHA Songbird in the wall

October 1947. Amrit is standing on the window's edge. A mob of Kabailis storms her village near Srinagar, and she can hear them running up the stairs to her room. She is expected to jump to an 'honourable' death. She turns to look at her children – they're hiding under the sheets just beside her – and hesitates. The cursed legacy of her troubled mother has been successful in dictating her life (and death), after all.

She was the first girl in the household to get educated and tiptoe around the patriarchal lines of society. She always had the love and comfort of her maidservant Banto, an orphaned Muslim girl who protected Amrit all her life but also resented Amrit for the fortunes that life denied her.

**Songbird in the Wall** seeks to understand the lives of the women in pre-Independent India and their brushes with postpartum depression, the freedom struggle, religious prejudices, and the traumatic gendered violence of the Partition that was a culmination of all these.

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Born in Ranchi, Poonam Saha grew up travelling across India, sampling and learning to appreciate cultures, languages, cuisines, and people. In her teenage years, she accidentally witnessed her grandmother reliving horrific memories of the Partition in a semi-conscious state, which led to her interest in the woman's perspective of the biggest human migration in history. Years later, she stumbled upon helping authors research and write. What followed was an inevitable story, born out of more than five years of research, and a lifetime of memories and sagas that laced together to become Amrit. Poonam currently lives in Hong Kong, where she shares her home with her husband, two daughters, and the people who walk in and out of her stories.

I could hear their footsteps in the street outside. Their horses, restless and sweating. Two floors up, at the back of the house, I could not see them, but I strained to count their feet, their voices. I stood staring in the dark, my heart beating hammers through my veins, in harmony with the thudding that shook the ancient wooden door that opened onto the street. The door of my room that stood between me and them shivering in anticipation. The edge of the windowsill cut into my palms as I pulled myself up onto the narrow ledge. All thoughts of courage and valour that I had dreamt of, deserted me. I didn't want to jump.

#### GUNIYA SHARMA ORCHARD OF LOVE

Arjun Pandita and Chitrangada Raina foolishly fall in love in the politically volatile Kashmir in the 1980s and abandon all practicality and logic to be together. Twenty years later, their marriage is falling apart.

Meera, their eighteen-year-old daughter has first-hand received the brunt of her parents' rotting love. But when her father gets into an accident after an argument at home, Meera struggles through life and therapy, tracing her family's dereliction back to their exile from Kashmir. She also falls in love with the mysterious Dev Mathur, a devastatingly handsome drug addict.

The novel travels through the tempestuous years of the family and its members' lives, unveiling the interwoven tapestry of their past: years stained and disfigured by death and resentment, but also full of unyielding love and hope.

**Orchard of Love** is a saga divided into three parts: The Chinar Tree, The Apricot Tree and The Jacaranda Tree, in which a family tries to navigate the distance between them — exploring treacherous emotions, young love, and a decades-old love of a marriage that's on the verge of crumbling to the ground.

The first and only time Chitrangada fell in love was at fourteen. He was older, smarter and interested in what she had to say. It was an instant but terrifying realisation because your first love always burns. It burns breathless with rosy cheeks and tempestuous sighs, looking at you the way fallen leaves look at barren branches, with so much longing and hope.



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Guniya was born and raised in Jammu. She wrote her first poem when she was nine years old, unaware that writing would become such a big part ofher life; not until ninth grade when a story started sprouting in her brain. A story she wanted to tell.

Orchard of Love is her debut work, which explores generational trauma in the scenic setting of Kashmir and Dehradun, inspired by her trips to Srinagar as a child.

Guniya currently lives in Jammu and works at a media production company. She continues to write and is working on her second book.

#### KEVIN MISSAL The Demon King


#### "At the height of your power, you shall lose everything." Such was the curse from his past that haunts his present.





#### KALLOL BHATTACHERJEE FIRST RECRUITS: INDIA'S FIRST DIPLOMATS

India was born as a rebel and the nationalist anti-colonial leadership that took charge of running the Government of India starting with the interim set up of 1946-47 had little experience in conducting foreign policy negotiations. Yet, at the dawn of independence, India already had an emerging canvas of foreign policy challenges stretching from Kashmir, big power politics, to technology import and industrialisation at home. As a result, the government of Prime Minister Nehru had to scramble to set up a service dedicated exclusively to diplomacy – the Indian Foreign Service. The diplomats of the first decade were personally selected by Jawaharlal Nehru and his close advisers including Girja Shankar Bajpai.

This book is a tour of the time in which the foreign service was created and also a recollection of the careers of some of the best officers – Leilamani Naidu, KM Kannampilly, Chandra Shekhar Jha, TN Kaul, Cyril John Stracey, Harivansh Rai Bachchan, and others – covering the entire spread of the Cold War to the early 20th century. This monograph plans to present the world as it was dealt with by first generation diplomats like A P Venkateswaran, Soonu Maneck Kapadia and Brajesh Mishra.

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### FRANCESCA MARINO **BALAKOT: THE TRUE STORY**

On the night of February 26, 2019, the Indian Air Force (IAF) suspended years and years of its non-intervention policy by crossing the Line of Control to attack the Jaish-e-Mohammed (JeM) training camp in Balakot, Pakistan. This was done in retaliation to the Pulwama attack on February 14, 2019, sending a clear message to Pakistan. However, Pakistan denied the presence of any JeM camp in Balakot; it also denied any casualties or destruction to property caused by India's retaliatory strike.

And that is the last we heard of the terrorist group. However, an eyewitness who was at the camp on the night of February 26 recalls the event and the following days, with details about the people present at the camp and the camp's power structure. This and more previously unpublished documents are what Debunking Balakot offers about the inside of the Balakot camp and the strike that happened that night. Along with an exclusive interview with Air Chief Marshal Birender Singh Dhanoa and an OSINT detailed satellite analysis to explain the strategic choice behind the strike.

The monograph will also demystify Jaish-e-Mohammed – it reveals buttoned-up details on the group's formation, its new and old training camp structures, its indoctrination of recruits, its mafia-family-style source of income, and its links with other terrorist groups, including the Taliban. #### HARLEEN SINGH THE LOST HEER FEMININE VOICES OF COLONIAL PUNJAB

The Lost Heer is a collection of women's voices from colonial Punjab of 1849–1947 whose stories are a homage to Heer, the symbol of a quintessential Punjaban - rebellious, brave, and daring. The Punjaban who dares to fall in love in a medieval patriarchal Punjab, elope with her lover despite being 'married' to another man, and stand up against the court for her love. Heer's courageous spirit that shapes history is what The Lost Heer attempts to highlight by documenting the stories of Heer's sisters: nameless women whose contribution has shaped our present world would have been much different.

Harleen has put together a collection of photographs and stories by combining years of cataloguing oral histories and anecdotes, scouring through personal archives and museum/ library archives, and interviewing real accounts of fortitude. Despite the history of most Punjabi women of that time being documented through the names of their fathers or husbands, Harleen has taken help of old magazines, newspapers, personal histories, and records to thoroughly corroborate these stories.

Some of these stories include that of Hardevi Roshan Lal. the first Punjabi woman to start her magazine and write a travelogue; Syeda Muhammadi Begum, the first woman editor in Punjab to publish a women's weekly newspaper; Meena Shorey (Khursheed Jahan), a young woman who shot to fame as the 'Larra Lappa' girl due to the hit song by the same title in 1949's Ek Thi Larki; and Sarla Thakral, the first Punjabi woman in India to qualify as a pilot after flying between Karachi and Lahore in 1936.


#### KHAQAN SIKANDAR That which flows

Muslim, Male, Multilingual, and Mobile — I am a recipe for disaster when it comes to crossing borders, and yet, I have crossed a lot of them.'

Meet Khaqan Sikandar, an international student from a third world country, a war survivor well acquainted with UN bureaucracy, fluent in Arabic, Spanish, and French. Khaqan had more doors open to him than he could have hoped for but as he went through them, he found that not many places spread their arms in invitation.

When Khaqan landed in a notorious Palestinian refugee camp in Beirut, things took an explosive turn as Lebanon erupted into a full-scale war with Israel trapping him in its deadly jaws. What followed was an unexpected journey that took him around the world – the Americas, Europe, Africa, and Asia – with life-altering lessons in this journey into adulthood. Lessons that made him confront his identity and Muslim history.

This is the story of how he wanted to change the world, instead, the world changed him.

#### SANDHYA MULCHANDANI Spirited: A cultural and social history of alcohol in India

Much like everything else in India, alcohol has mystical beginnings; it made its appearance as Soma. It came with the promise of new thought-processes, and thus an opportunity to contact the Other, often experienced and expressed as a union with God.

Soon enough, its consumption started getting regulated – who could access liquor and of which kind got determined by one's caste and varna. By the third century, regulatory licensing, brewing taxes, tavern licenses, and more came into play by the wily Chanakya. After all, anything being consumed in such quantity had to be funnelled in as a source of revenue for the king and his country.

And so forth the book traces alcohol's journey from the inebriated gods and goddesses during rituals, to the kings and heroes, all the way to the common men and women who would devour it and sing paeans in its glory, thus making the drink an intrinsic part of India's literary and artistic expression. Every region had its own brew from local produce, its own laws and rituals, even as monistic religions like Buddhism and Jainism struggled to preach abstinence and austerity. Undeterred, India continued to drink its way through wars and pestilence, reaching its acme during the Mughal rule where the kings raised the bar for excessive indulgence. After the locals' exposure to imported liquor brought in by Europeans and the British art of brewing beer, infusing gin, and making antimalarial tonics, the stage was finally set for Indian-made foreign liquor to thrive.

The use of alcohol has been an issue of great ambivalence throughoutIndia's long history. This complex yet simultaneously celebratory nature of the drink is what Spirited pours over its pages for its reader to reflect.

#### ROSHEENA ZEHRA A *Muslim* Woman of the World

A **Muslim** Woman of the World is part memoir, part social commentary based on the simultaneously stifling but empowering lived reality of being not just a woman but a Muslim woman of this world.

Rosheena Zehra pens a powerful narrative, balancing her very personal experiences with the knowledge and research her background as a journalist in the gender space affords her. This book looks at the many dynamics of being a Muslim woman in contemporary, urban society, examining experiences and flawed expectations imposed on women by outward forces as well as the damaging ideologies internalized through years of microaggressions.

Covering topics like gendered differences in upbringing, prejudices against and dismissal of women's concerns by health professionals, an internalization of guilt and acceptance of mental and physical abuse, dating culture (or the lack thereof), street harassment and Gedi culture, and the many familial pressures on women and fractured interpersonal relationships, Rosheena paints a vivid picture of life as a Muslim woman in India.

A Muslim Woman of the World is an articulation of the long process of unlearning that each one of us must undergo for the sake of our own mental peace, if nothing else. It is a book that so many of us will find wishing we could have read when we were wide-eyed, naive eighteen-year-olds, struggling to come to terms with our place in a bafflingly patriarchal society.

#### NAWAL ALI Marginalisation on the loc

The Line of Control is a de-facto border between India and Pakistan that divided people, their land and their families. These peoplealong this line have not only been dispossessed of theirintimate family relations, but also their earlier transnational trade relations and political agency. The living conditions have deteriorated, making them victim and a pawn in a space where they have no say about their lives.

**Marginalisation on the LoC** comes from journalist and researcher Nawal Ali's need to understand their lives. An interview-based narrative non-fiction exploring the stories as well as the the many ways in which the people experience marginalisation along the LoC in terms of culture, geography, economy, politics and space.

This book is an attempt to bring into focus the lives around this line on the map, the lives this line has affected, changed, and brought to stagnation. It is purely through the narratives of the people, built on the foundation of their memory and intergenerational stories. The interviews, conducted across seven different regions over four years, focus on multiple aspects like livelihood, national identity and security, governance, etc.




#### MANBEENA SANDHU NOTHING TO LOSE

#### KALLOL BHATTACHERJEE COOMAR NARAIN: INDIA'S BIGGEST SPY SCANDAL

On 17 January 1985, the Intelligence Bureau carried out raids in multiple locations across Delhi. The search threw up sensational number of official papers that captivated the nation for months, triggering what would later be known as the Coomar Narain spy scandal.

This is the story of Coomar Narain, the former stenographer, his colleagues, and his troubled marital life with the charismatic and forceful Geetanjali Narain or Greta.

The story looks at how Coomar, who hailed from Chittoor in Kerala landed in Delhi, and became one of the biggest underthe-radar lobbyists working for a famous engineering firm till his debut in the world of trade involving diplomats and arms deals.

The book looks at the dramatic witch hunt against Coomar, his complex personality, and his successful career which ended in a tragic episode that engulfed him and the political structure of an entire era.

#### SANDHYA MULCHANDANI THE UNCOMMON MEN: A PARALLEL BIOGRAPHY OF RK LAXMAN AND RK NARAYAN

R.K. Laxman and R.K. Narayan changed the landscape of Indian literature. The two siblings were extraordinary men – one became India's greatest English novelists when India was still adapting to the language, and the other brought political satire to Indian households. The two R.K.s never forsook their roots of a traditional middle-class South Indian household. If one R.K. (Lakshman) created the Common Man, the other R.K. (Narayan) celebrated the Everyman.

R.K. Laxman was a man with strong political and moral ideologies. He was interested in the events and bureaucratic idiosyncrasies that shaped India and depicted them in a gentle, laconic manner.

R.K. Narayan, on the other hand, has been often compared to William Faulkner. He's best remembered for his fictional village Malgudi, whose not-so-naive inhabitants helped Narayan comment on life from a philosophical perspective.

However, despite an age difference of 15 years, the lives of these two gifted brothers were deeply intertwined, as depicted in the biography. The younger brother helped Narayan's books with his sketches for Malgudi Days when it was adapted as a TV series, while Lakshman had constant support of his older brother. 




